# St. Mary second grader first in national art contest

A budding young artist has put Traverse City and the Grand Traverse Area Rock and Mineral Club (GTARMC) on the map with a unique accomplishment: winning first place in the National Fossil Day Art Contest, a competition sponsored by the National Park Service

This year's theme encouraged students nationwide to explore the fascinating world of fossils and the history they preserve, inspiring students to use their creativity to depict the prehistoric past in colorful and imaginative ways.

Iris Wild, a second-grader and budding Grand Traverse Area Rock and Mineral Club pebble pup, submitted a beautifully detailed piece that stood out among hundreds of entries from across the United States.

She is a second grade student at Lake Leelanau St. Mary.

Wild's artwork captured the essence of the ancient world through a mix of vibrant colors, skillful shading, and meticulous attention to detail. Her artwork depicted a serene beach within the Sleeping Bear Dunes National Lakeshore with Petoskey stones, bringing to life these ancient corals that existed millions of years

hearing the news. Fossils have always fascinated her and learning about how the Earth used to be. ## **Grand Traverse Area Rock and Mineral Club: 2024 Pebble Pup Program Year-End Report**


#### Introduction:

The Pebble Pup program, an integral part of the Grand Traverse Area Rock and Mineral Club, has continued to foster curiosity and education among young enthusiasts in the field of geology, minerals, and earth sciences throughout 2024. With a mission to inspire the next generation of geologists and hobbyists, the program has seen significant achievements this year.



#### Membership and Participation:

The Pebble Pup program welcomed 15 new members in 2024, bringing the total number of participants to 24. The program's diverse membership includes students aged 6 to 18 from Grand Traverse and surrounding counties. Monthly attendance averaged 8 participants, demonstrating strong engagement and enthusiasm. Last November had a record attendance of 13 pups.



#### Highlights:

Monthly meetings during the school year at the VFW hall on the third Thursday of the month, 5:30 to 6:15 pm.

#### Workshops and Hands-On Activities:

- Fossil Excavation Workshop: Participants learned excavation techniques and identified fossils from the Devonian Period, sparking interest in paleontology at the Boardman River Nature Center.
- Participation at the MakerFest festival at the Civic Center.
- Providing programs at the Traverse Area District Library.

The Pebble Pup program aims to expand its reach in 2025 by introducing virtual workshops, enabling participation from students in more remote areas. Plans are also underway to host a geology competition, fostering collaboration and friendly competition among young geologists.

The Grand Traverse Area Rock and Mineral Club's Pebble Pup program remains a beacon of inspiration for young minds fascinated by geology and Earth sciences. Now in that communion of discovery these small fossils yield the deepest glimpse through time to the world before we came, and warn of a future we must face— while just outside forests change, species die, and life recedes.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>1</sup> Estella Leopold assisted me in the actual paleontological research mentioned in this poem. A sediment layer associated with the burial site of a Columbian Mammoth at the Florissant Fossil Beds National Monument was found to contain Ice Age pollen and spores. This research resulted in a paper presented at the Geological Society of America in Denver in 2013. Estella was one of the original "Defenders of Florissant" and was instrumental in the Florissant Fossil Beds in becoming a national monument. Estella is the daughter of Aldo Leopold, who wrote the *Sand County Almanac*. Estella passed away February 25, 2024. She was 97 years old.
